Across communities, and guided by evidence, compassion, and a commitment to real change, we reach those who are most disadvantaged. This year, we launched a vocational skills project in Tanzania and Togo, inspired by European Blue Crosses, where adopted employment schemes for vulnerable people highlight the importance of work for a healthy life. Self-help groups meet in 26 Blue Cross countries, IBC Academy continues to equip staff for greater impact, and comprehensive prevention efforts offer new perspectives to youth in seven countries, including Ukrainian refugees in Romania and Poland.

Meanwhile, developments in cannabis legalisation and the ongoing lack of commitment to effective alcohol policies make strong advocacy more urgent than ever. The growing evidence linking alcohol to cancer, rising mental health challenges, increasing loneliness and online addictions demand our attention. At the same time, there are cuts in development funding in many countries, pushing us to be more innovative in reaching those who need us most.

In a world where many struggle for a second chance, our Christian values remind us that hope, dignity, and support must be extended to all. Your dedication makes this possible.

To our members, donors, supporters, board, and staff – thank you. Your commitment and generosity make this work a reality. Together, we continue to serve with love.



### **IBC at a Glance**

#### Who We Are

IBC is a Christian value-based, politically independent non-governmental organisation. The roots of today's organisation lie with the Blue Cross Movement founded in 1877. The international umbrella organisation was founded in 1886, currently compromising 37 national Blue Cross organisations in Africa, Asia, Europe, and Latin America. This vast organisational network tackles alcohol- and other drug-related health-, social-, and development issues through advocacy, prevention, treatment, and aftercare programmes. IBC promotes this approach through a joint global voice and enables exchange and learning between Blue Cross Organisations around the world.

### **Project Milestones We've Reached Together**

#### Project phase 2021–2024

2024 marked the end of the 2021– 2024 "Prevention through Life Skills Development" project phase. Over four years, the initiative reached over 79,000 children, youth, and community members across Chad, Congo, Tanzania, and Togo. Through structured Life Skills activities, participants built resilience and reduced risks linked to alcohol and other drug use. A 2024 external evaluation in Chad showed measurable improvements in participants' interpersonal skills, conflict resolution, decision-making, and attitudes toward gender equality.



#### **Expanding Horizons in 2024**

In 2024, IBC expanded its focus to address participants' broader socio-economic realities. New initiatives in Togo and Tanzania introduced vocational training and income-generating activities, complementing our established Life Skills work. This integrated approach supports participants in developing practical skills while reinforcing protective factors that promote sustained behavioural change and healthy, self-determined futures.

### "The Blue Cross gave me support, purpose, and identity."

"My name is Raoul and I'm 25.

I was born into a poor farming family in a southern province. My father sent me to the city to study, but family difficulties during secondary school led me to leave home. I moved in with a friend and because I didn't want to be a burden, I ran telephone kiosks and small shops to support myself and stay in school. Life wasn't easy, and I went through dark moments, even considering taking my own life. But I pulled myself together and, at 19, became a motorbike taxi driver.

I had already been involved with the Blue Cross and kept coming back to their activities. I became a peer educator and club leader, and over time, the other young people in the club became my family. Through the Blue Cross, I learned to set goals, make responsible choices, and avoid the pitfalls many others fall into. After a few years as a communications and community manager at another company, I came back to the Blue Cross as a Life Skills facilitator.

One of the biggest impacts on my life was becoming a father. Many young men in my situation choose to run away or pressure the mother into an abortion. But for me, that was never an option. I'm fully involved in raising my son. Every morning, I take him to school before starting my day, and I feel pride and joy knowing that I'm providing for him. I'm committed to giving him the childhood I never had, making sure he never feels the instability and struggles that I went through. I don't want my son to grow up with those same feelings of lack and uncertainty. Instead, I guide him, teach him, and provide for him in ways my own parents never could.

Even though my contract ends with the project phase-out, I'll always remain connected with the Blue Cross because it gave me support, purpose, and identity that shaped my life. As a father and a mentor, I'm now committed to being a role model for my son and for other young people in my community."

## YOUTH CONNECT – Together for change!

Youth Connect is more than just a network – it is a movement! As the name suggests, it brings together young people from all over the world and empowers them to initiate social change through local action.

Youth and young adults from Blue Cross organisations exchange ideas on diverse topics related to alcohol and other drug prevention through Youth Connect's digital discussion forums, learning from and inspiring each other for more than two years now.

IBC is delighted with the continued success of this dynamic network. Teenagers and young adults meet 3-4 times a year online and network via social media such as Facebook or WhatsApp, with more people showing interest by joining the Youth Connect network! During the online sessions, participants lead intense discussions, exchange ideas, and motivate each other to take positive action against alcohol and other drugs. One major topic of discussion is the marketing of alcohol. The network has scrutinised how the alcohol industry designs its messages to appeal to young people, with the aim of exposing the narrative of the alcohol industry and combatting the harmful commercial marketing toward youth. But that is not all!

The group also discusses concrete, creative measures and effective strategies that can be implemented locally to raise awareness among young people and encourage them to act.

"Youth Connect is a platform for learning for me and my fellow youth. I observe how both facilitators and participants engage with the discussion topics creatively. It is also a great networking platform for me, connecting me with many new colleagues, which is truly exciting." Gloria, Youth Connect participant from Tanzania It is incredibly inspiring to see the creativity and drive of these young people, including the use of music, theatre, and other creative means to develop innovative and sustainable solutions for fear prevention that are tailored to meet the precise needs of their age group. This allows them to motivate their own generation while also encouraging others to participate.

IBC wants to give young people the courage and hope that they can be ambassadors of change and can make a positive difference – both in their own lives and in the lives of their families and communities. Together they are shaping a future where alcohol and drug prevention is no longer taboo!

### Prevention through Life Skills in Poland and Romania

Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine in 2022 and the ongoing war have displaced 10 million people inside and outside Ukraine, with 6 million having fled to neighbouring or Western European countries. In response to the resulting mental health needs, IBC in collaboration with our Polish and Romanian Blue Cross partners implemented a comprehensive Life Skills-based prevention project in 2024–2025 for Ukrainian refugee youth and their local peers in Bielsko-Biała, Poland and Sibiu, Romania.

Funded by GlobalGiving and delivered in a trauma-sensitive manner, the project addressed the psychological challenges faced by vulnerable young people affected by war, supporting their mental well-being and healthy decision-making. Simultaneously, it responded to the risks related to the harmful use of alcohol and other drugs among local youth – prevention needs that were found to be high in both Poland and Romania.

The facilitation teams, including local and Ukrainian refugee professionals, underwent comprehensive training from Blue Cross Tanzania and IBC experts. They learned to use IBC's multi-layered intervention model and participatory facilitation methods essential for motivating youth to actively participate in Life Skills education for positive behaviour change.

Life Skills sessions in schools reached 318 youth, and a total of 887 individuals directly benefited from the project across both countries. The Life Skills sessions were the foundation of the project whilst the summer camps undoubtedly stood out as the most memorable experience for participants. The camps provided an environment where primarily Ukrainian children and teenagers could deepen and practice the skills they had learned. The Romanian project team further extended its outreach through public community events, organizing Halloween- and Christmas-themed Life Skills parties for children.

The project team in Sibiu was further able to successfully engage the Romani community – an ethnic minority that has long faced systemic discrimination and marginalization. These challenges persist to this day, leaving Romani children particularly vulnerable and exposed to heightened risks, which makes prevention work in this context all the more critical.

As IBC's first Life Skills prevention intervention in a European and refugee context, this project revealed considerable needs in the field of prevention in both countries and made key stakeholders more aware of the interventions needed. Although project activities conclude in May 2025, we remain hopeful to return in the future, pending additional funding.

### Meet IBC Member Organisations

#### **Brazil, South America**

The Blue Cross Brazil (Cruz Azul) team provides support through age-appropriate support groups to children and adolescents who are socially vulnerable due to their parents' use of alcohol and other drugs. These groups are located in different regions of the country and facilitated by trained volunteers.

In 2024, the team also hosted weekly self-help groups for people suffering from harm caused by alcohol dependence as well as for their families, held in churches and community centres. Additionally, Cruz Azul launched an initiative focused on indigenous communities, particularly those in the northern region of the country, delivering prevention, support, monitoring, and treatment of alcohol and other drug use. In addition to these efforts, Cruz Azul conducts prevention work in schools with a dedicated team of over 15 staff members, along with continuous training for those working in the care and treatment of people suffering from addiction.

#### **Ivory Coast, West Africa**

As part of its 2024 addiction prevention training, Blue Cross Ivory Coast partnered with the local treatment centre to conduct three training sessions for educators and NGOs. The goal was to equip them with addiction prevention tools to strengthen their communities and help at-risk youth achieve their educational goals. While the April training session covered addiction trends, transnational drug trafficking and future outlooks for Africa, the one in July covered hard drugs, which are widely used in Ivory Coast.

The training session also emphasised the importance of recognising early signs of adolescent drug use, effective communication strategies and holistic addiction management. The October session focused on student cannabis use, its academic impact, and prevention strategies.





# Audit Report 2024

This standard requires that the examination is planned and performed to identify material misstatements in the Financial Statements. Based on the limited statutory examination, nothing has come to the statutory auditor's attention that causes him to believe that the Financial Statements of International Blue Cross do not give a true and fair view of the financial position, the results of operations, and the cash flows in accordance with Swiss GAAP FER or do not comply with Swiss law and the association's article of incorporation.
